STUDENTS

Our **18,000 undergraduates** come from 50 states and 100 countries.

80% of enrolling 2010 first-years ranked in the top 10% of their high school class, and 89% reported a GPA of 4.0 or higher on a weighted 4.0 scale.

45 Carolina students have been selected as Rhodes Scholars. Since 2000, **Carolina has produced more Rhodes Scholars than any other state-supported school**, and the ninth most of any public or private school.

Our students are **as accomplished as they are intelligent**. The 2010 entering class includes entrepreneurs, club founders and presidents, researchers, Math and Science Olympiad champions, peer leaders and mentors, writers, editors, and award-winning artists and performers.

Carolina students are strong competitors for **distinguished scholarships in the U.S. and abroad**. In 2009-2010, we had two Rhodes Scholars, two Goldwater Scholars, one Truman Scholar, and one Udall Scholar.

Carolina offers **more than 70 majors**, a full range of academic programs, and **2,700 courses**.

Nearly 50% of undergraduates participate in **research** across academic disciplines.

300 study-abroad programs operate in 70 countries.

First-Year Seminars provide a unique, intimate learning experience.

Students have access to more than **30,000 internship opportunities worldwide**.

The **Honors Program** is a unique, inclusive program offering more than 120 courses in 30 areas of study.

There are more than 600 clubs, teams, and organizations, with new ones starting every year.



7 TIPS FOR APPLYING

1. **Apply online for a smoother application experience**. Apply online through the Common Application. Visit *commonapp.org* to learn more and start your application.

- 2. Keep your email address current. We'll communicate with you largely through email, so it's important we have an up-to-date email address.
- 3. **Get your test results in**. We require either the SAT or the ACT with writing. International applicants whose native language is not English should also submit a TOEFL or IELTS score. Have the test results sent directly from the testing service. Be sure to take the exam by November for early action and by December for regular decision.
- 4. **Don't slack on the essays**. Your essays are one of the best ways for us to get to know you as a person. Let your personality shine through.
- 5. **Complete the Financial Certificate**. International students must certify sufficient financial resources to pay for their education and related expenses. Be sure to include this form and the required documentation with your application.
- 6. **Give your teacher plenty of time to write a thoughtful recommendation**. Choose a teacher who knows you well and, more importantly, can elaborate on your specific contributions to the classroom or extra-curricular activities.
